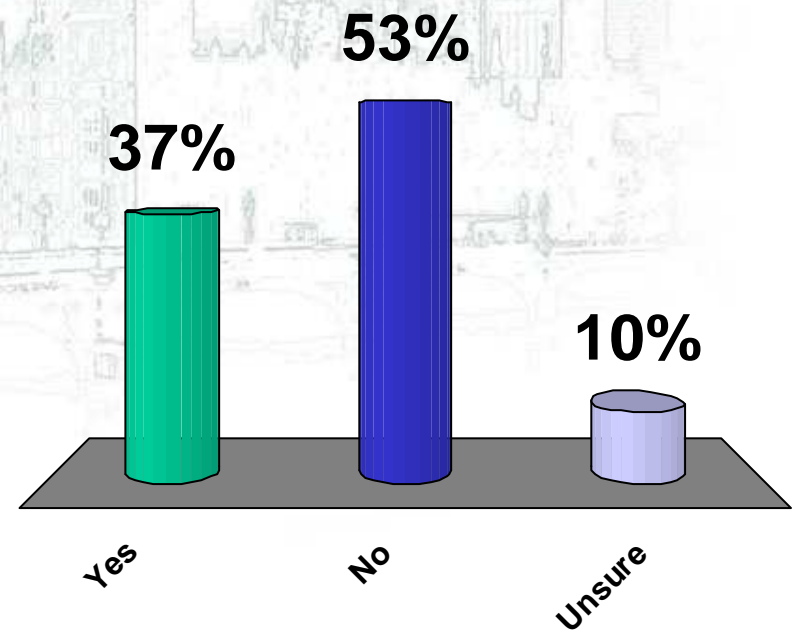

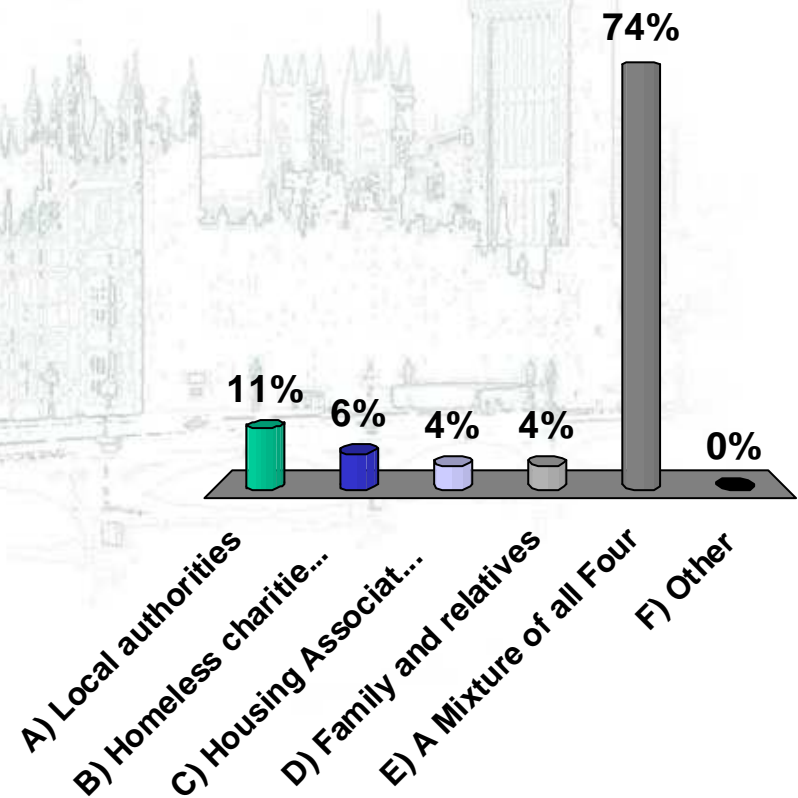
Do you believe the government's 2010 target of ending temporary accommodation for 16 to 17 years old will be met?

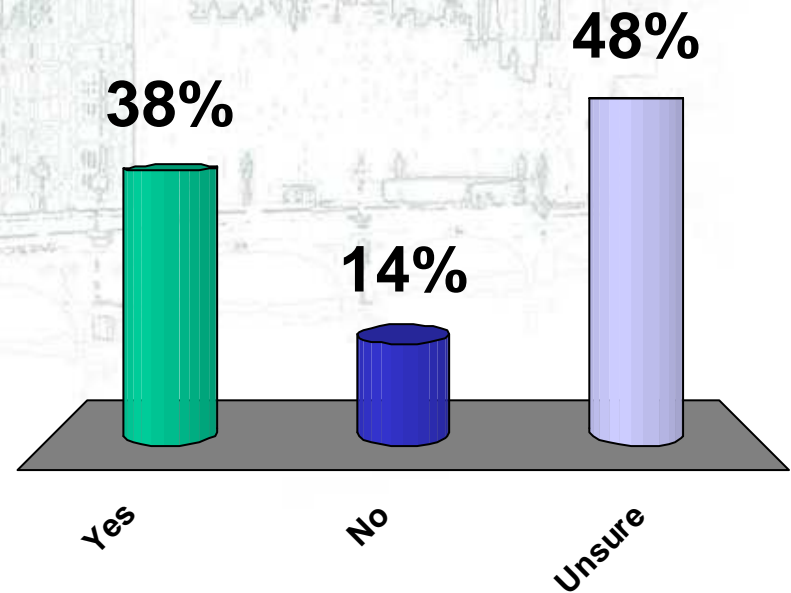

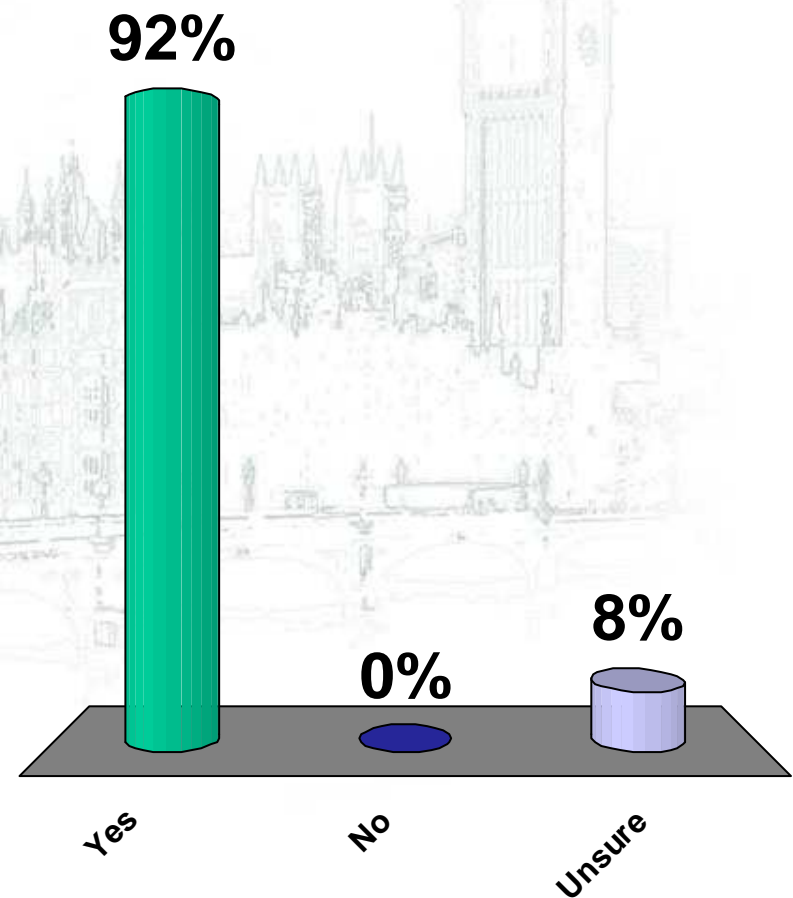

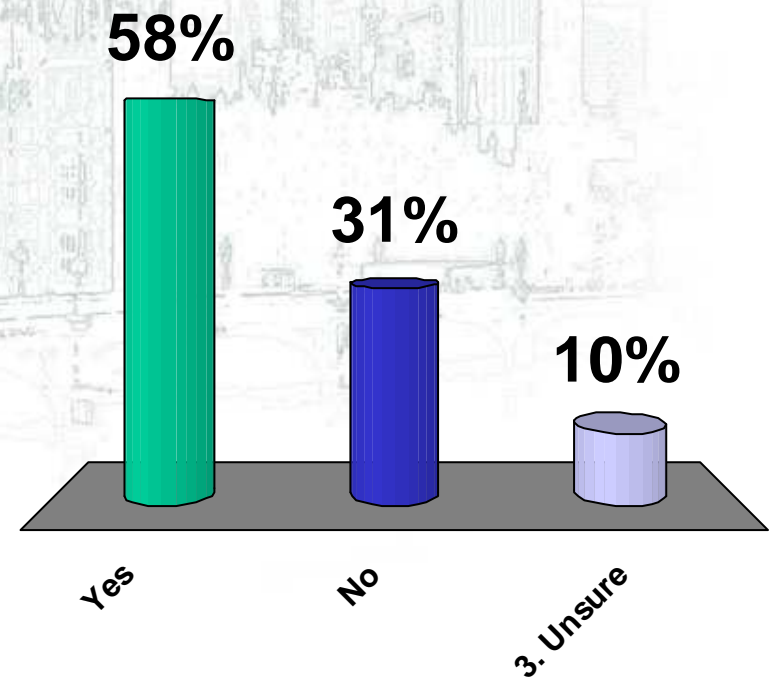
# Should more be done to understand parents' perspectives on youth homelessness?

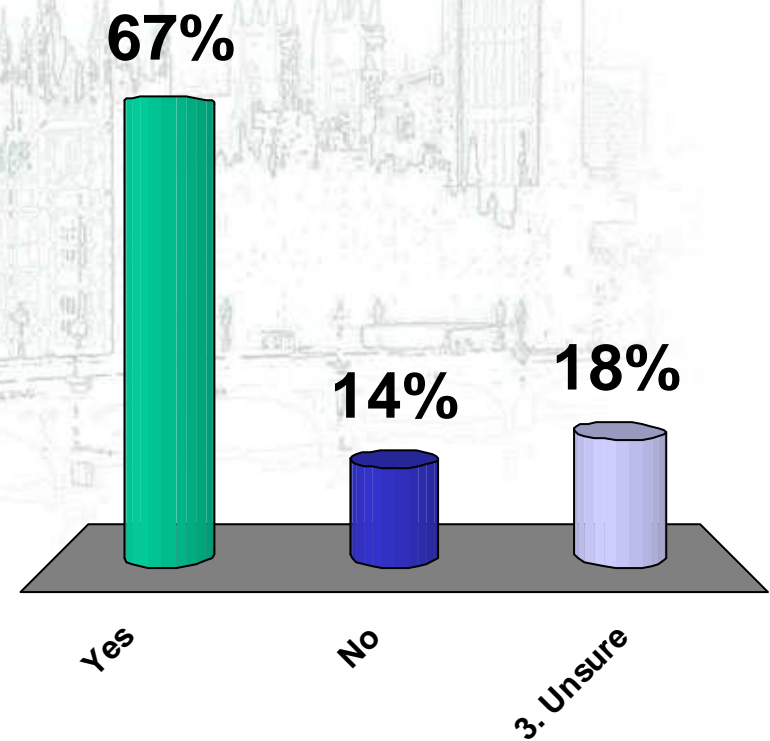

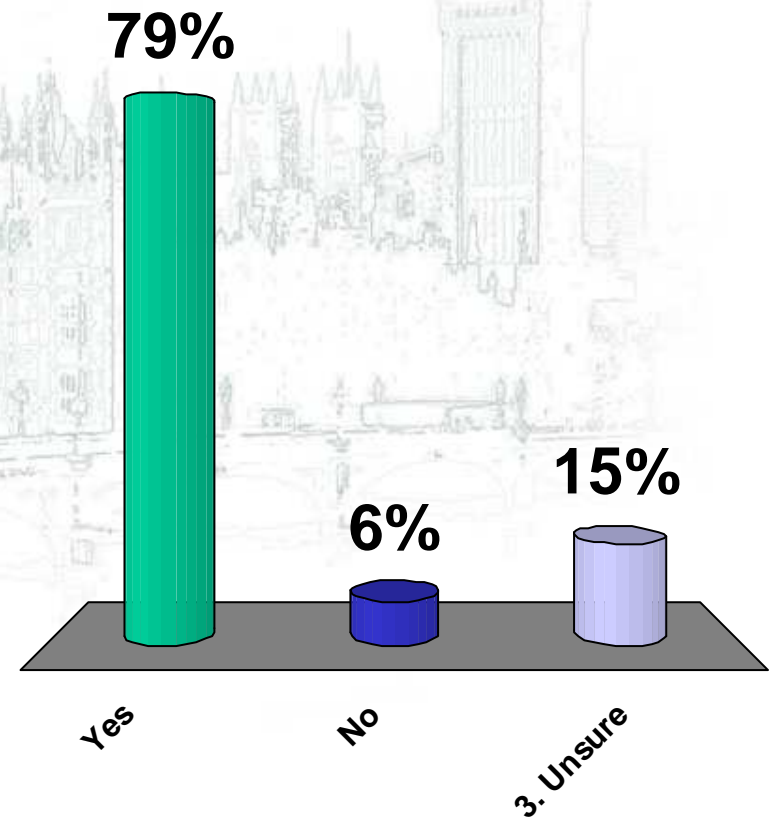

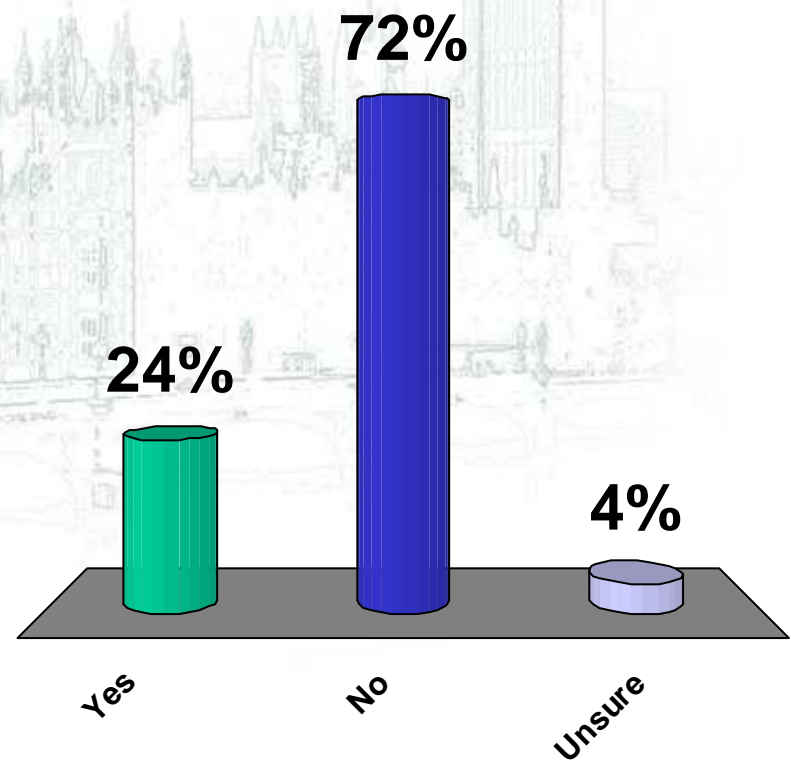

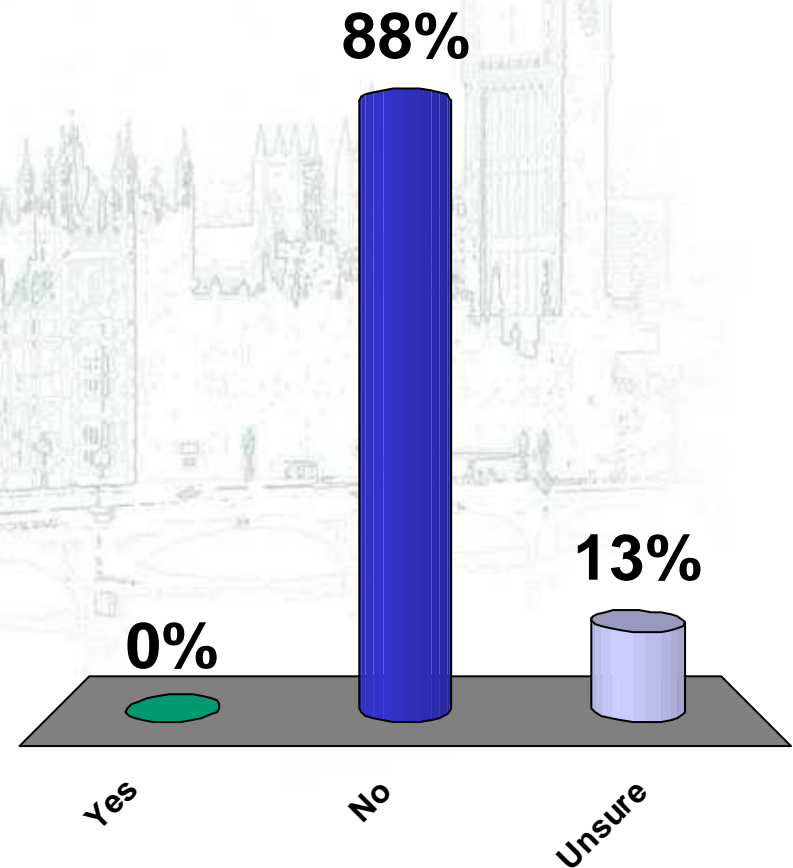
